UNDERSTANDING CRIME REPORTING

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NATIONAL PERSPECTIVE ON REPORTING CRIME

Transitioning from Uniform Crime Reporting to National Incident-Based Reporting System According to the National Incident-Based Reporting System, Volume 1: Data Collection Guidelines, by the U.S. Department of Justice,

"Since the establishment of the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program in 1930, the volume, diversity, and complexity of crime steadily increased while the UCR Program remained virtually unchanged. Recognizing the need to address crime's growing challenge, the law enforcement community in the late 1970s called for a thorough study of the UCR Program with the objective of revising the Program to meet law enforcement's needs into the twenty-first century. The National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is the result of that study."

In January 1989, the FBI began accepting NIBRS data from a handful of agencies. As more contributing law enforcement agencies learn about the rich data available through incident-based reporting (and as resources permit), more agencies are implementing the NIBRS. In 2016, the FBI Director agreed to transition the UCR Program to NIBRS-only data collection by January 1, 2021. Modernizing crime data reporting is no longer optional.

UNDERSTANDING NIBRS FIGURES

NIBRS compiles detailed reports on two types of offenses: Group "A" offenses and Group "B" offenses. The two groupings are based on the amount of reporting required for each. Both incidents and arrests are reported for Group "A" offenses, while only arrests are reported for Group "B" offenses. The following criteria is used to determine whether a crime should be designated as a Group "A" offense:

- 1. The seriousness or significance of the offense.
- 2. The frequency or volume of its occurrence.
- 3. The prevalence of the offense nationwide.
- 4. The probability of the offense being brought to law enforcement's attention.
- 5. The likelihood that law enforcement is the best channel for collecting data regarding the offense.
- 6. The burden placed on law enforcement in collecting data on the offense.
- 7. The national statistical validity and usefulness of the collected data.
- 8. The national UCR Program's responsibility to make crime data available not only to law enforcement but to others having a legitimate interest in it.



UNDERSTANDING CRIME REPORTING

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Group "A" offenses are categorized into one of the three following categories:

1) Crimes Against Persons = Counts one offense for each victim

2) Crimes Against Property = Counts one offense for each distinct operation

(except motor vehicle theft / one offense is

counted per stolen vehicle)

3) Crime Against Society = Counts one offense for each violation

This report provides a snapshot of the Brownsville Police Department's National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) data that was queried from the Records Management System (RMS) on January 4, 2022. The document will remain LIVE as the RMS system is updated regularly due to ongoing investigations. Data queried on or after January 4, 2022, could change or vary from other reports.



BROWNSVILLE CRIME INDEX COMPARISON 2021-2020

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In 2020, the City of Brownsville Police Department completely transitioned from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program to National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS). NIBRS was Implemented to improve the overall quality of crime data collected by law enforcement, NIBRS captures details on each single crime incident—as well as on separate offenses within the same incident—including information on victims, known offenders, relationships between victims and offenders, arrestees, and property involved in crimes. Unlike data reported through the UCR Program's traditional Summary Reporting System (SRS)—an aggregate monthly tally of crimes—NIBRS goes much deeper because of its ability to provide circumstances and context for crimes like location, time of day, and whether the incident was cleared. The UCR utilized the reporting of seven index crimes, thus making it possible for measurement and analysis of the crime index. The seven index crimes are categorized as either crimes against persons or property crimes. Crimes against persons include murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault. Property crimes include burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft. There are a number of differences between the UCR and the NIBRS yet the most important difference is that UCR is a summary based reporting system while NIBRS reports criminal offenses at the incident level. Unlike data reported through the UCR Program's traditional Summary Reporting System (SRS)—an aggregate monthly tally of crimes—NIBRS goes much deeper because of its ability to provide circumstances and context for crimes like location, time of day, and whether the incident was cleared.



2021 - 2020 STATISTICS

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In calendar year 2021, there were a total of **3,319** index crimes in the City of Brownsville as compared to **3,289** in 2020. The crime index **increased by 0.91%** when compared to 2020.

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Crime rates are compiled to compensate for the changes in population and reflect the number of people affected by crime in a given population and are expressed as the number of crimes per 100,000 residents.

As of April 1, 2020, the estimated population for Brownsville was 186,738*, an increase of 3,957 from July 1, 2019's estimated population of 182,781. The Census Site does not show a population estimate for 2021 at the time this report was produced.

During calendar year 2021, Brownsville's crime rate was 1,777.4 index crimes per 100,000 persons. The crime rate decreased by 21.9 index crimes per 100,000 in population which translates into a 1.2% decrease when compared to 2020's crime rate and population.

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Crimes against persons and property crimes are the two categories in which the seven index crimes are classified into. In 2021, **19.22**% of the crimes reported were crimes against persons and **80.78**% were property crimes

PERSON CRIMES

Crimes against persons are the personal confrontation between the perpetrator (suspect) and the victim. Due to this nature, crimes against persons are considered to be more serious than property crimes.

A total of **638** person crimes occurred during 2021, a **7.77%** increase from the **592** reported in 2020. The 2021 crime rate was **341.7** person crimes per 100,000 persons. Aggravated assault accounted for **67.1%** of all person crimes. Robbery accounted for **20.69%**, rape accounted for **11.29%**, and murder accounted for **0.31%**.



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ROPERTY CRIMES

Crimes against property include the offenses of burglary, theft and motor vehicle theft. The object of the theft-type offenses is the taking of money or property, but there is no force or threat of force against the victims.

A total of **2,681** property crimes occurred in 2021 as compared to **2,697** in 2020. Property crimes decreased **0.52%** in 2021 compared to 2020. The 2021 crime rate was **1,435.7** property crimes per 100,000 citizens as compared to **1,475.4** for 2020. Theft accounted for **81.72%** of all property crimes. Burglary accounted for **13.35%** and auto theft accounted for **4.92%**.



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MURDER

Murder and non-negligent manslaughter as defined in NIBRS is the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. This offense category includes any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault or commission of a crime. Attempted murder and assaults with the intent to kill are not counted as murder, but are included in NIBRS as aggravated assault. Suicides, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides are also excluded from the murder classification.

The murder rate in Brownsville for 2021 decreased by five, a **71.43%** decrease. The rate of murders per capita (every 100,000 persons) for 2021 was **1.1**.



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RAPE

In January 2014, Texas Law enforcement agencies began reporting Rape information using the FBI's revised Rape definition. This new definition marked a significant change to the way Rape data is collected.

The number of rape incidents increased to **72** in 2021 as compared to **50** in 2020. The rate of rapes per capita (every 100,000 persons) for 2021 was **38.6**.



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ROBBERY

Robbery, in NIBRS is defined as the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force, threat of force or violence, or by putting the victim in fear. It is a violent crime that frequently results in injury to the victim. Included in this category are assaults to commit robbery and attempted robberies.

The Robbery rate in Brownsville for 2021 decreased by **13.16%** as compared to 2020. The rate of robbery per capita (every 100,000 persons) for 2021 was **70.7**.



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AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

Aggravated Assault is defined in NIBRS as an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Statistics for aggravated assault include attempts to commit aggravated assault.

The aggravated assault rate in Brownsville for 2021 increased by 12.79% when compared to 2020. The rate of aggravated assault per capita (every 100,000 persons) for 2021 was 231.3.



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BURGLARY

Burglary, for NIBRS purposes is the unlawful entry of a structure with the intent to commit a felony or a theft. While the use of force to gain entry is not required to classify an offense as burglary, attempted forcible entries to commit burglary are counted in this crime's statistics.

The burglary rate in Brownsville for 2021 decreased by **9.82%** when compared to 2020. The per capita rate (every 100,000 persons) for 2021 was **191.7**

Clearance

A total of **83** cases were cleared with **97** arrests compared to **183** in 2020. This is a **20.7%** clearance which is above the national rate of **13.5%**. Burglary arrests **decreased** by **40.3%** when compared to 2020. The estimated value of property reported stolen from burglaries was **\$161.454.00**.

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THEFT

Larceny/Theft in NIBRS is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Larceny/Theft includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, and other things of value in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. In the NIBRS program, this crime does not include embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, and the passing of worthless checks. Motor vehicle theft is not included in this category as it is a separate index crime offense.

Motor Vehicle Theft, for NIBRS purposes, is the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that travels on the surface but not on rails. Specifically excluded from this category are motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment.

The motor vehicle theft rate in Brownsville increased by **9.09%** in 2021 when compared to 2020. The per capita rate (every 100,000 persons) was **70.7**. Estimated value of all motor vehicle thefts is approximately **\$1,562,340.00**.

The Auto Burglary and Theft Task Force is a grant funded resource provided by the Auto Burglary Theft Prevention Authority (ABTPA). The Brownsville Police Department is awarded this grant and serves as the project manager in the program area, which is comprised of elements from Brownsville PD, Edinburg Police Department, Pharr Police Department and McAllen Police Department. The total grant amount for this year is \$1,020,922.00; this covers 70% of salaries and provides a budget for equipment and materials.

The goal of the Auto Burglary and Theft Task Force is to reduce the number of incidents of auto theft and auto burglary. The Task Force plan includes intelligence sharing, public awareness campaigns along with an aggressive strategy to locate, arrest and prosecute suspects that commit burglary of motor vehicle and auto theft crimes.

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Volume

A total of **132** auto thefts were reported during 2021.

A total of **645** burglary of motor vehicle reports were reported this year.

Value of Stolen Vehicles

In 2021, motor vehicle theft victims suffered losses totaling **\$1,544,497.00**.

This total value loss represents an **increase** of **19%** when compared to 2020 where total motor vehicle theft losses were of **\$1,297,560.00**.

The average dollar loss per motor vehicle theft was \$11,700.73 an increase from \$10,723.63 in 2021.

Recoveries

In 2021, 180 stolen vehicles were recovered.

The total value for the vehicles recovered in 2021 is \$2,191,404.00 with an average of \$12,174.46 per vehicle.

Motor Vehicle Theft Arrests

In 2021, Brownsville Police arrested **165** persons for motor vehicle theft or related offenses; when compared to **223** for 2020, this represents a **26% decrease**.

Persons Arrested

Adult males arrested represented **78%** of all Auto Theft related offenses, while adult female represented **16%**. Male juvenile represented **6%**, while female juveniles represented **0%**.

EMERGENCY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

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The Brownsville Police Department Emergency Communications Center received **151,006** calls for service. The total number of calls includes calls for all public safety services and reflects a decrease of **6.76%** when compared to **161,960** calls for service in 2020.

In 2021 the Emergency Communications Center received an average of **413.72** calls for service per 24-hour period. This represents a **8.81%** decrease in the number of calls per day when compared to calendar year 2020 which averaged **453.69** total calls per 24-hour period.

These call totals do not reflect non-emergency business related calls, including customer service support for medical providers for non-emergency patient transfers and general questions concerning non-police related city services. These calls are not tracked and may represent upwards of an additional 80-100 calls per day. The activity listed above represents only primary calls for service in which an event or incident number was generated.





The Brownsville Crime Stoppers Program began in 1982 from the efforts of our Chamber of Commerce and the Brownsville Police Department. Our Program now operates as an independent organization. The concept has developed into a combination of efforts by local media, businesses, civic and social clubs, law enforcement agencies, and the public.

Brownsville Crime Stoppers is an anonymous reward program that involves the citizens, the media, and local area law enforcement in an effective crime control program. The program is designed to assist law enforcement agencies in the identification, apprehension, and prosecution of persons suspected of having committed a criminal act.

Crime Stoppers is based on the principle that "someone other than the criminal has information that can solve a crime" and was created to combat the three major problems faced by law enforcement in generating that information: fear of reprisal, an attitude of apathy, or reluctance to get involved.


